

Bequests to Toronto East General Hospital Make A Difference

Margery Warren - The late Margery Warren grew up in the east end of Toronto and taught at a local public school. Her executors were empowered in her Will to make a charitable gift. Fortunately, she left sufficient funds to make a unique and lasting gift in her name that could help to make a difference. In consultation with the TEGH Foundation, the idea of a rooftop garden was developed. This garden, located off the Helen Aird Carswell Complex Continuing Care Unit provides relief and relaxation as well as spiritual and emotional enrichment to patients and their families year round.

Jennifer Houghton - Jennifer Houghton courageously fought cancer for a number of years. A long time Beach resident, her kindness, generosity and desire to make things better for others made her a very special person. Sadly, Jenny died in 2005. Funds from her estate are being used to support the comfort and care of cancer patients and their families at our hospital and will help equip the expanded Oncology Clinic.

Dr. William and Rozetta Mosley - The late Dr. William and Rozetta Mosley left a bequest of almost \$400,000 directed to the TEGH Emergency Services Triage Area. Dr. Mosley was a physician who served in the TEGH Emergency Department for many years. He knew first hand the need to support ways to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of treating emergency patients. This gift allowed the launch of a new ER Tracking System- an electronic whiteboard that provides current information on emergency patients and is updated every minute. This allows TEGH medical staff to communicate quicker and more comprehensively on the status of patients in the ER for optimum management of patient flow through the hospital.

Harold and Leonard Catford - Harold Catford was best known by friends for the many humorous cartoons he created. Beach residents for over 50 years, Harold and his brother Leonard left a substantial bequest to Toronto East General Hospital that allowed an endowment to be set up. The income from this gift is used to purchase vitally needed equipment and technology as identified by our physicians. Last year, funds from the endowment purchased a \$75,000 printer for CT scans.
